CHAPTER 2:

The History Of The Rosary

Initially, the rosary consisted of the recitation of 150 Ave Marias (Hail Marys), which matched the number of Psalms in the Psalter. It was usually referred to as the "Psalter of Mary." Over time, the Rosary developed, and the recitation of the Hail Mary was structured into groups of 10, known as decades. Each decade was preceded by the recital of the Our Father prayer and followed by the Glory Be prayer.

The mysteries linked with the Rosary, which are contemplations on major events in the lives of Jesus and Mary, were added gradually. The early mysteries concentrated largely on the life, passion, and resurrection of Jesus. Later, the inclusion of the joyous, sad, and beautiful mysteries widened the meditations to cover various phases of Jesus' life and Mary's position as his mother.

The diffusion and popularity of the Rosary rose in the ensuing decades, with numerous Catholic groups and laypeople advocating its practice. Popes had a significant role in legalizing and fostering devotion to the Rosary, consolidating its standing in Catholic spiritual practice.

It's crucial to note that although St. Dominic is commonly credited with the inception of the Rosary, there is still academic controversy surrounding the true historical genesis of this prayer form. Some academics suggest that the

Rosary's genesis was a more lengthy process, touched by many influences and earlier prayer traditions.

Regardless of its precise roots, the Rosary is a beloved prayer practice for Catholics worldwide, promoting reflection, devotion, and a development of faith through the recital of prayers and meditation on the mysteries of Christ and the Blessed Virgin Mary.

The Mysteries Of The Rosary

Sorrowful Mysteries: The Sorrowful Mysteries center around the suffering and sacrifice of Jesus Christ. They invite believers to

contemplate the depth of Jesus' love and the price he paid for the salvation of humanity. The five Sorrowful Mysteries are:

a) **The Agony in the Garden:** Jesus prays in the Garden of Gethsemane, facing the anguish and accepting God's will before his arrest.

b) **The Scourging at the Pillar:** Jesus is brutally scourged at the hands of Roman soldiers.

c) **The Crowning with Thorns:** Jesus is mocked and crowned with thorns, signifying his kingship.

d) **The Carrying of the Cross:** Jesus carries his cross through the streets of Jerusalem on the way to Calvary.

e) **The Crucifixion and Death:** Jesus is crucified and dies on the cross, offering himself as a sacrifice for humanity.

c) **The Descent of the Holy Spirit:** The Holy Spirit descends upon the apostles and Mary on the day of Pentecost.

d) **The Assumption:** Mary is assumed, body and soul, into heaven at the end of her earthly life.

e) **The Coronation:** Mary is crowned as Queen of Heaven and Earth.

Luminous Mysteries: The Luminous Mysteries were introduced by Pope St. John Paul II in 2002 to offer additional meditations on the public ministry of Jesus. They highlight

significant moments of revelation and the manifestation of God's kingdom. The five Luminous Mysteries are:

a) **The Baptism of Jesus in Jordan:** Jesus is baptized by John the Baptist, and the voice of God affirms his identity as the beloved Son.

b) **The Wedding at Cana:** Jesus performs his first public miracle, transforming water into wine at the wedding feast.

c) **The Proclamation of the Kingdom of God:** Jesus preaches the Good News of the Kingdom of God, calling people to repentance and faith.

d) **The Transfiguration:** Jesus takes Peter, James, and John to a mountain where he is transfigured before them, revealing his divine glory.

e) **The Institution of the Eucharist:** Jesus institutes the sacrament of the Eucharist during the Last Supper, offering his body and blood for the salvation of humanity.

These Mysteries give a framework for thought when saying the rosary, enabling Christians to reflect on and engage into the major moments of Jesus' and Mary's lives. Closing Prayer: After completing the five decades, close your Rosary with a concluding prayer, such as the Hail Holy Queen or the Memorare, expressing thankfulness for the opportunity to contemplate the mysteries and invoking the intercession of Mary.

CHAPTER 4:

How To Pray The Rosary

Step-by-step Guide On How To Pray The Rosary

Begin with the Sign of the Cross: Hold the crucifix of the Rosary and make the Sign of the Cross, saying, "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."

Say the Apostles' Creed: While clutching the crucifix, say the Apostles' Creed, declaring your belief in the essential doctrines of the Catholic religion.

Pray for Our Father: Move to the first big bead (the one just after the crucifix) and pray for Our Father, the prayer that Jesus taught His followers.

Pray the Hail Mary: On each of the following three little beads, pray the Hail Mary while thinking on the virtues of faith, hope, and love.

Pray the Glory Be: After the three Hail Marys, pray the Glory Be, expressing thanks to the Holy Trinity.

Announce the First Mystery: State the first mystery you will be meditating on (e.g., "The Annunciation").

Pray Our Father: Move to the next big bead and pray to Our Father.

Pray 10 Hail Marys: On each of the 10 little beads (referred to as a "decade"), pray a Hail Mary while contemplating the mystery disclosed.

Pray the Glory Be: After the ten Hail Marys, pray the Glory Be.

Recite the Fatima Prayer: Following the Glory Be, you might opt to recite the Fatima Prayer, which was revealed to the three children at Fatima: "O my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell, lead all souls to Heaven, especially those most in need of Your mercy."

Announce the Next Mystery: State the second mystery you will be meditating on (e.g., "The Visitation").

Repeat Steps 7–11: Repeat steps 7–11 for each of the remaining mysteries, going from one big bead to the next and reciting the proper prayers and meditations for each mystery.

Conclude with the Hail Holy Queen. After completing all five decades, recite the Hail Holy Queen, a prayer invoking the intercession of Mary, the Queen of Heaven.

Make the Sign of the Cross: Finally, complete the Rosary by making the Sign of the Cross and saying, "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."
